seedling bags to community nature ecologists



UNIVEN students in partnership with Dzomo la Mupo (DLM), a community organisation seeks to enhance indigenous skills of traditional agriculture, support agroecology, healthy soil management and healthy food sovereignty have recently distributed facemasks and seedling bags to community nature ecologists. The initiative was supported by the African Centre for Biodiversity (ACBIO) through donations. ACBIO is a research based organisation that focuses on biosafety, seed safety and agricultural biodiversity in Africa.





156 face masks and 3,964 Seedling bags were distributed amongst 10 communities. The communities that benefitted are Tshidzivhe, Vhutalu, Tshilungwi, Vuvha, Malale, Magoro, Mutale, Tshirolwe, Vhuronga and Mapate.

Distribution of materials in question was coupled with the check-ups on how the beneficiaries have been impacted by Covid-19 in terms of planting as well as the feasibility of observing Covid-19 rules.

Mrs Annah Mphigalale, one of the beneficiaries of facemasks and seedlingbags at Tshirolwe village commended this collaboration because she received seedlingbags which she can plant her trees, and that she will no longer use old tins to plant her trees. Speaking on behalf of Tshirolwe beneficiaries, Mrs Mphigalale expressed that it is encouraging to receive facemasks and seedlingbags that will assist them to do even better and achieve more.

She condemned deforestation and soil erosion and encouraged other beneficiaries to be resilient, patient and to look out for opportunities available around them. Mrs Mphigalale showcased her products for human consumption out of baobab fruits such as powder and juice. She said that the products are a good medication for pain relief. She concluded by thanking UNIVEN and Dzomo La Mupo delegates for supporting Tshirolwe village with the tools to use during this Covid-19 era.

Beneficiaries were happy to receive seedling bags as it makes it easier for them to plant seeds without having to improvise with cutplastic bottles. They indicated that although it is difficult for them like everyone else, they never missed an opportunity to plant their indigenous trees during this Covid-19 pandemic era, of course obeying lockdown regulations.
